THE ASCENSION ADVANTAGE

Act 1:9: And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight.

What emotion the disciples must have experienced as Jesus receded into the sky. After the trauma of losing the Lord and miraculously receiving Him back again, they evidently hoped that any separation was past and they could finally enjoy the promised kingdom. (Verse 6) But instead, Jesus responded with the disheartening words of verses 7-8, and disappeared again from their sight.

What was happening here? Why was He dumping His ministry on them and going into retirement? It did not make any sense. Two angels had to assure them that Jesus would one day return to them and it was only then that they returned to Jerusalem to await the promise of the Father. (Acts 1:4)

Certainly, we can sympathize with the disciples' feelings for we also have wrestled with these questions. Why did Jesus leave us to do an impossible task, and why has He not returned? It has been more than 2000 years since He disappeared with no indication how much longer we have to wait. Is He going to return or has He forgotten about us?

Notice three answers from this passage to these questions.

CHRIST DID NOT ABANDON HIS PEOPLE

Thoughts of Christ abandoning His people shows either ignorance, or a failure to exercise mental discipline regarding the Word of God. Christ has not turned His back on His followers, but will be faithful as promised.

The ESV Study Bible reminds us in John 16:7 that it was to our advantage for Christ to go back to Heaven for only then would we receive something more needful.

This truth may seem strange to us; especially when we consider the miracle working power of Christ. After all, what could be better than having Christ in the flesh? But we must have faith that God does all things well. If the Father chose to take Jesus back to Heaven He must have good reason for it.

Consider the Holy Spirit's purpose and marvel at God's wisdom.

John 16:13-14 Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, *that* shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come. *14 He shall glorify me*:



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From Page 2:redemptive sacrifice on the cross, resurrection from the grave, and triumphal ascension into Heaven to reign at God's right hand as Mediator and King. However, He could not do His best work until after Jesus' ascension. It is only as all things were completed that He could operate in the fullness of His power.

The work of the Holy Spirit in new-covenant power happens only on the basis of the blood of Christ. If the blood has not yet been shed, the fulness cannot be manifested. It is the fullness of a blood Gospel that enables the Holy Spirit to achieve His purpose of "glorifying Christ" by convicting people of the sin of not believing in Christ as the Son of God, shattering illusions of self-righteousness, and enabling them to come to a correct judgement concerning Christ.

Yet this is not the only way the Spirit glorifies Christ. There are other things that He brings to the table. We submit a partial list:

- The Holy Spirit regenerates and sanctifies the believer: (Joh 3:5-6, 8; Rom 15:16)
- The Holy Spirit provides assurance of salvation: (Rom 8:16)
- The Holy Spirit is a Divine Helper assisting believers in their service to God. (Joh 14:16-17)
- The Holy Spirit purifies and empowers us. (Eph 5:18)
- The Holy Spirit provides spiritual character, forming Christ in us: (Gal 5:16,18,25)
- The Holy Spirit is the guarantee that we shall receive what God has promised us. (Eph 1:14)
- The Holy Spirit is the Teacher of all things: (Joh 14:26)
- The Holy Spirit inspired the writing of the NT. (Joh 16:13)
- The Spirit helps believers understand the scriptures: (1 Cor 2:9-13)
- The Holy Spirit intercedes for believers in prayer. (Rom 8:26-27)
- The Holy Spirit provides and distributes spiritual gifts: (1 Cor 12:4-11)

Obviously, life without the Holy Spirit would be bleak indeed. We would be frustrated because He was humanly limited to one place at a time. Faith would be more abstract, impersonal, and mysterious. It is the omnipresent Spirit, who brings the presence and privileges of Christ in a personal way. He enables us to simultaneously see, understand, and experience the glory of the Savior.

As Gail Seidel writes: Living without the Holy Spirit would be like living without life support, bankrupt, and trying to make my Christian life work on my own. ¹ (To Page 12)



Middle of what you ask? An object, the road, a philosophy of thought? No, none of these. Not long ago, I read a comment by a well-known author that reminded me in all aspects of my life, I am sitting in the middle of both younger and older women. In my simple mind, I had never really thought about it. I always considered myself a young woman; ready to learn from those much older and wiser than I. But to be a giver of said godly wisdom? That seemed overwhelming. Yes, as a pastor's wife, I am often asked for spiritual advice and counsel, but I never saw myself as that older woman. I never thoughtfully contemplated the value of my multiple years as a wife, mother, but most importantly, as a follower of Christ. As the season of Mother's Day approaches and I am preparing to love on the ladies at my church, I began to pray about how God would have me improve my stance here in the middle.

Proverbs 13:20 states "Whoever walks with the wise, becomes wise, but the companion of fools will harm him."

Recently, I was able to spend some time with a pastor's wife that is a few years my senior. She is someone that I know without a doubt God placed in my life several years ago. Over time, she has been a continuous witness to me of who He is and how He aids those who surrender all to Him. In this recent visit, I was so encouraged by her steadfast Christian walk, her grace and patience in a very busy time of her life, and her willingness to be used by Christ. In reflecting our time together, I was reminded of another verse in Proverbs 31:26, "She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the teaching of kindness is on her tongue." I gleaned knowledge from her years of experience in both her calling and her personal walk with Christ.

The Apostle Paul admonishes in Titus 2:3-5 for older women to be sound in their faith, self-controlled, to seek out and train those who are younger. How can I live out this admonition? After praying over this for several weeks, I have felt God direct me to reach out to a couple younger moms I know, invite them to lunch, out for coffee, to the park, whatever works for their schedule. As many mothers with young children are aware, sometimes just the knowledge that someone understands the season of life and is praying, can sustain through some long days. But not leave it as "I'm praying over you." Do it. In their presence. I can witness that God will use the words prayed to encourage and uplift long after the meeting is over. Be that older woman and offer encouragement in the day-to-day life. Be an example of godliness and offer guidance in their walk with Christ. Invest in their life. It could have an eternal impact.

Whatever your age, my dear one, you are in the middle. Find ways to glean godly wisdom from those that are older, but perhaps most importantly, seek His help in finding that young woman that needs guidance, a helping hand, a listening ear, words of wisdom, or the power of prayer poured over her. Philippians 4:6 reminds us that "In everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God." Seek His will in this and He will show you the way.

In the Bible, Genesis 2:8, it is written, "And the Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden and there He put the man He had formed." Then in verse 15 it states that the Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to dress and keep it.

I had the privilege of growing up on a 40-acre farm. Gardens were a must. When we think back of all the work that is involved in making a garden, then we get an idea of the task assigned to Adam.

There is little doubt that the Eden Garden would not have blossomed the way it did without Adam's touch, especially after the fall of man. It is a picture of salvation; we must be careful to do as God has commanded.

My mind dashes back to the spring of the year. I begin to think it is about time to start preparing the garden for planting. I must work the ground when it is not too wet, otherwise it will be cloddy all the year. We may at this time need that helpmate that God made for man. I use a tractor with a disc and drag to prepare the ground, but the drag is not heavy enough to smooth out the dirt, so I need help. I could have put weights on it, but then I could not dump it at the right time and place. Presto, I get my wife to ride it and then she just hops off at the right place. Hence, if we want to get to the Lord then He works on us until we desire His way.

Once the ground has been prepared, we are ready to plant the seeds. When we have finished the planting, we trust the Lord to keep the ground moist enough to germinate the seeds. The seeds begin to swell, and the sprout pushes out toward the top of the soil. If the ground gets too hard or dry the seeds may not rot or not sprout. John 12:24 states, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit."

Likewise, we die to self and put Christ first in our life that we might begin to grow spiritually and bear fruit for Him. Even then we may face hard circumstances. Our God will send the rain to the crops and will also meet with us in prayer and softens things for us as we need.

Now things begin to take hold and grow, but we notice the tares/weeds that are taking place among our crops; Out comes the power tiller and we work on the weeds to remove them. Now, there are times the Lord begins to reveal some tares in our life. If we do not get rid of them, they will choke out our growth. We cannot get rid of them by ourselves and must depend on God to help us. Those tares must be uprooted.

The growing season is advancing quite rapidly. The garden is growing great, blossoms are appearing on the beans and tomatoes, and ears on the corn. This is what God designed them to do, preparing to produce fruit. The Lord is spiritually developing us. It is not long until He begins to convict our hearts of some of the things He is not pleased with, and places we go that are hindering our progress spiritually. We must be quick to submit to His will. We will now walk in that light and progress in Him. We may have to break off with the old crowd, but we will gain new fellowship. He may even be revealing what He wants us to do with our life. He will make it plain our fruit is appearing, and others will notice our progress. We see the light and will walk therein.

As the season continues the changes in the seed plants are obvious. The beans are hanging down, tomatoes are beginning to change color, the corn stalks have tassels and ears are developing. The Lord of all is sending the sunshine and rain and all things are responding. So, it is with our lives. As they

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Spring is seen as a fresh beginning. Winter with all its cold and harsh weather is behind us. We must be faithful to sow and cultivate gospel seeds. There are multitudes of hungry souls perishing without God. 2 Corinthians 9:6, "But this I say, he which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." We, as Christians, have a

momentous task of praying for God's guidance and wisdom in reaching out to others. Additionally, we must be invested in showing them the love of Jesus. For example, just inviting a person to church once, whether they come or not, is not proper planting and cultivation. We must be committed to long-term endeavors. Psalm 126:5-6 promises us that "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." As we visualize the gospel seed sprout, we should tenderly work and develop a relationship with them, just as we would the physical seeds in which we plant.

What happens with all this hard work? Production! Proper preparation and continuous cultivation will yield fruit. With the help and guidance of the Holy Spirit in their lives and willingness on their part to respond, we will see spiritual growth. The example of our lives and the love that we have shown individuals will make an impact. It may not be immediate. More than likely, this process will take time and greater patience than we anticipated. However, Galatians 6:9 reminds us "Let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season, we shall reap, if we faint not."

As we go forth this year, let us be faithful to seek for personal revival, endeavor to cultivate the relationships with people that God brings into our lives, and anticipate results for God's Kingdom.

A Lesson for Children

I once knew a widow that had two sons. One day I went to visit this woman who worked hard all day in an office. One of the boys was home most of the day, but when I entered the home after the working hours of the mother, the beds were still unmade, the lunch dishes of the two boys were still on the table, on one chair a dirty shirt had been thrown and on another was some soiled socks.

The mother started apologizing to me, but the boy interrupted and said, "Mother, I don't have any clean socks. I've looked and looked. All my socks have holes in them."

"I'm sorry son. I haven't time."

"Well, it looks to me like you could keep clothes fixed for me. Say, I need 50 cents right now."

"You'll have to wait until payday, I don't have any money."

"Well, what's a fellow going to do?"

I felt like saying, "Go work yourself and help your mother." But instead, I quietly looked around the room. The boy could have easily picked up his own clothes and put them away. He could have made the beds, maybe not as well as the mother could have, but as well as he could. It would not have hurt him a bit to wash up those dirty dishes so his mother could have had time to mend those socks.

You know, boys, some of the best tailors in the country are men. Some of the best cooks are men and all the soldier boys certainly learned to make their beds.

Here I am talking only to boys, but I have known girls who did not keep their rooms clean. Girls who could help their mothers so much. They can learn while they are in their pre-teens and early teens to wash and iron their own clothes. Boys should never let their mothers clean the sidewalks, beat the rugs, or take out the trash. Wouldn't it be lovely if all of us would remember to help every time we can?

Here are some rules for sharing the work in the home: 1. Hang up all your clothes, 2. Place your soiled clothes in the hamper, 3. Leave the lavatory and bathtub clean, 4. Look for ways to save your parents extra steps, 5. Offer to babysit so your parents can go out together.

Jude 1:3 "It was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints."

con-tend [kən'tend] Verb: struggle to surmount (a difficulty or danger):

The Grecian games of St. Jude's time were the pinnacle of Greek culture. People would travel from miles around to come and enjoy these spectacular events. The athletes were like no others in history and were idolized for their physical prowess and skill.

Such athleticism does come easily and seeing how the games were such a major part of Grecian culture, the athletes would devote their lives towards their physical and athletic excellence. It was not enough to simply be "good" but rather complete devotion to excellence was essential to be a winner. It was a "battlefield" for the athletes. A battle of wit, skill, physical, mental, and dietary discipline to determine who would be the winner.

Why do I mention this? The statement "contend for the faith" made by Jude has war-like connotations. Scholars believe that his mind likely drifted to the lifestyle of these athletes as his thoughts were being put to paper. This letter written to the church at large became a specific warning; not necessarily against moral issues as one might guess, but against false teachers, bad doctrine, and compromise. Even so early in the New Testament church there were those who sought to divide and corrupt.

Jude recognized the dangers of compromise. He saw an inclination towards deception even in a time so close to the ministry of Jesus, and issued a warning that echoes throughout history. The challenge is not to grow lazy or careless in our doctrine and thinking but to strenuously (as an athlete training for an important competition) contend for truth. Jude recognized the importance of standing on truth no matter who spoke against it.

The reality is that Satan has been around for a long time. It is important for us to remember that he is a tactician, a master of warfare. This should not scare us for we have God on our side; yet we must be wise. Satan will use whatever means necessary to trip us up. Whether it be through blatant sin and rebellion or the slow, continuous, soul-rot that is compromise.

PAUL ALSO SPEAKS A GREAT DEAL TO THIS MATTER. IN EPHESIANS HE SAYS, "PUT ON THE FULL ARMOR OF GOD SO THAT YOU MAY WITHSTAND THE WILES OF THE DEVIL!" NOTICE AGAIN THE CONNOTATIONS TO WARFARE.

How can we do this in a practical sense? There are so many viewpoints in the world! There is so much confusion! The truth is that the bible holds the answer to every question we have. It is where we draw our beliefs and where we form our doctrine.

As a disciplined athlete will train in preparation for His sport, we also must put in our "reps" when it comes to church attendance, bible study, and attendance to the place of prayer. It is not merely a pastime but rather the life blood of a Christian. We cannot fight a vicious battle if we are starving spiritually. We cannot defend ourselves if our "armor" is rusted and worn.

A time will come in the life of every believer where He will be attacked spiritually at his very core. His values and beliefs will be brought into question. Satan will use people (As he did in St. Jude's time) to draw you away and make you doubt what you know to be true. Maybe it will not be outright rebellion but rather "a form of godliness which lacks the power thereof." If we are not anchored in God, sensitive to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and spiritually sharp we are headed for disaster. Will you be prepared? Contend.

From Page 6: We do not need to feel shortchanged because Christ ascended into Heaven. Working in cooperation with the other members of the Trinity, He did what was needful for us. He completed His earthly stage of salvation's plan, and supplied the Holy Spirit who would carry it to the next phase.

CHRIST IS STILL ACTIVE IN MINISTRY

Col 3:1 If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God.

Some might conclude that the right hand of God involves a Lazy-Boy recliner and refreshments; Christ, His earthly ministry now finished, does not have much to do until His Second Coming; but again, this would again be a misconception. The redemption plan was completed and Christ's place in the plan shifted, but He is hardly inactive.

Consider briefly Christ's role in the atonement. We do not know much about Christs pre-incarnate existence other than He has always existed within a divine Trinty composing one glorious God. This instrument of creation was One of Three, worshipped unceasingly by angels and heavenly beings alike.

Yet, when mankind fell away from God, Christ consented to surrender His heavenly position that He might represent sinful human beings. His great compassion compelled Him to embrace a human nature, in addition to His divine nature, that He might become our sin bearer and Savior.

Atonement for sin required a blood sacrifice and Christ became a man that He might declare the will of the Father, (His prophetic office) and reconcile us back to Him. (His sacrificial office) As John Wesley once wrote "He suffered in a measure what we would have suffered had we been eternally lost" and it is because of His vicarious suffering, death, and resurrection, that God's wrath has been appeased, salvation secured, and eternal life provided for all who will believe.

However, does Christ's ascension mean that Christ's incarnate role is now over with Him returning to His preincarnate position and personhood?

No. Christ was and always will be divine, but once He took on the form of a man, He took on that form forever. He now and will always be the God-man, 100% divine, but 100% human. It is a human face and body, with nail scarred hands, that is waiting for us in Heaven.

Furthermore, Christ is as active in the plan of redemption as He ever was. Now that He has completed His substitutionary sacrifice as the Passover Lamb, He has moved on to the next phase of the plan, which is reigning as our High Priest and King.

Just as the Old Testament High Priest served to make atonement for the sins of the people, so Christ serves perpetually in the courtroom of Heaven.

- He sprinkles His blood on the mercy seat.
- He acts as the intermediary between God and man.

- He serves as our Advocate and Intercessor pleading for us when we pray.
- He is our divine Lawyer arguing our case if we sin, securing forgiveness and restoration.
- He is our assurance that we will be resurrected upon our earthly death to everlasting life.
- He is our King reigning over His worldwide empire until the day all things will be restored.
- He is preparing a place for us to be with Him forever.

Christ's preincarnate position was glorious. He was equal to the Father and the Holy Spirit, but by displaying His holy character through His earthly life, death and resurrection, His glory has been carried to a new level and He will be praised eternally. (Rev 5:9-10, 12)

Obviously, Christ's ascension should never be a source of angst to us but one of comfort and encouragement. The ascension ensures that Christs ministry of Prophet, Priest, and King continues and will one day be acknowledged by the entire world. It ensures that the Holy Spirit will be poured out on His people and that we never need fear condemnation.

CHRIST WILL ACCOMPLISH WHAT HE STARTED

Acts 1:11: Which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.

As we consider this verse, we think of the doctor who said to his patient: "If I have told you once, I've told you a hundred times---I do not treat amnesia cases." Obviously, this frustrated physician was dealing a serious case of forgetfulness.

It is clear from these passages that Jesus has no such malady. Everything that He promised is and will be fulfilled.

- The gospel will be preached to every people group.
- The last soul will be saved, and Christ will return.
- The saints will be called to their reward and the wicked will be judged.
- Sin will be punished and Satan's work destroyed.
- The earth will be renewed and sorrow will be no more.
- Christ will reign without any challengers and everything will be according to the perfect will of God. Not one thing from all that God has declared will be omitted.

Allow me to encourage you to draw strength from this ascension truth. Do not be dismayed at the absence of Christ but delight in the advantages that have been provided. Continue being faithful for we will certainly see Him soon.
